Educational and Therapeutic Resource Advisor Report AGM 2022

My job as Resource Advisor continues to be very interesting and rewarding as new clients join with a variety of conditions and challenges. It is also great to be able to keep supporting our current clients. With Covid challenges over the year for our families and ourselves we have adjusted our service as necessary and have still been able to be available for our clients.

Often my role is expanded to keep me challenged and to enable me to provide a worthwhile, and very necessary complimentary service to early intervention programmes, schools and many adult organizations and support groups.

Frequently I am informing clients of services/activities/agencies available to assist them that they haven't heard about before coming to the Library.

The Home Visiting Service – This a vital service that the library offers, - *and is our point of difference*. Families are really grateful for this essential service.

A number of the families I visit have two children with disabilities. Parents/carers need the support, encouragement and especially a 'listening ear'. Additionally, I am liaising with the child's therapists so we are all using the same skill focus to enable the child develop to their full potential.

My main objective is specifically involved around the issue of appropriate items to assist the person, to achieve skills and reach the level of development they are working on and extend the skill as appropriate. Therapists and teaching staff are always commenting on how great our resources are, and how they cover such a wide range of abilities and skill areas.

Points of Interest

- I attended the Show Your Ability expo in March 2021 at Pioneer Stadium. I saw a number of our families, occupational therapists and physiotherapists from a variety of organisations.
- Talks to various early learning centres and parenting groups were given during the year.
- Each year we have a wish list of resources needed, input is welcomed from professionals and clients, I then select the needed resources to the value of around \$12,000 which Chris prepares for presentation to approach our funders.
- New resources are very popular and are all beautifully presented by our cataloguing department with new colour coded labelling to help with placement in the library and to soon be able to scan the resources.
- University students interested in product design for those with disabilities visited; occupational and physiotherapy students while on placement in Christchurch spent time at the library with me.
- Ruby McGruddy from Nationwide Health and Disability Advocacy Service met up with me to discuss her role and see about our service.

I love finding resources to help a child/adult with multiple challenges, but it is even greater to find a person's strength and interests to find resources to achieve their goals.

My main goal is always for people to leave the library with a positive plan in place with hope and anticipation in their eyes.
