Educational and Therapeutic Resource Advisor Report AGM 2024

After 15 years my job as Resource Advisor continues to be very interesting and rewarding as new clients join with a variety of conditions and challenges and it is also great to be able to keep supporting our current clients and professionals who come into the library,

Often my role is expanded to keep me challenged and to enable me to provide a worthwhile and very necessary complimentary service to early intervention programmes, schools and many adult organizations and support groups.

Therapists and teaching staff are always commenting on how great our resources are, and how they cover such a wide range of abilities and skill areas.

Frequently I am informing clients of services/activities/agencies available to assist them that they haven't heard about before coming to the library.

Talks and networking with various early learning centres and parenting groups, community groups and Early Intervention providers were an important and busy part of my year.

Each year we update our resources for hire depending upon client's needs, this year my wish list was approximately \$10,000, which is passed onto Chris who approaches various funders.

When the resources are delivered, they are prepared by our cataloguing department who present them beautifully in consistent containers with a coloured label as the library resources have now been all colour coded. This makes it easier for volunteers to put items away and easier for clients when choosing.

Sensory items are in high demand as our number of clients increase who are on the autistic spectrum disorder and children with sensory processing disorders.

I was involved in the making of our video which is to be used to reach a wider audience for people who aren't aware who we are and for people to get a clear understanding about what we actually do and what we can offer. The filming day was very busy, and I felt like I had run a marathon after it but a great experience to be involved in.

The Home Visiting Service – This a vital service that the library offers, - *and is our point of difference*. Families are grateful for this essential service.

A large number of the families I visit have two children with disabilities. Parents/carers need the support, encouragement and especially a 'listening ear'. Additionally, I am liaising with the child's therapist, so we are all using the same skill focus, to enable the child to develop to their full potential. My main objective is specifically involved around the issue of appropriate items to assist the person, to achieve skills and reach the level of development they are working on and extend the skill as appropriate.

I love finding resources to help a child/adult with multiple challenges, but it is even greater to find a person's strength and interests to find resources to achieve their goals. My main goal is always for people to leave the library with a positive plan in place with hope and anticipation in their eyes.

I greatly enjoy working with Laurane, Chris and Vivien and all our wonderful volunteers. I couldn't achieve my job to such a high standard without this ongoing support. **Charlotte Ganderton**
